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### Gramsci On Hegemony Intellectuals And

Gramsci developed the notion of hegemony in the Prison Writings. The idea came as part of his critique of the deterministic economist interpretation of history; of "mechanical historical materialism." Hegemony, to Gramsci, is the "cultural, moral and ideological" leadership of a group over allied and subaltern groups.

### Gramsci on Hegemony - Not Even Past

According to Gramsci the intellectuals are the "deputies" of the dominant group—the functionaries, exercising the subaltern but important functions of political government and social hegemony. In particular, the organic intellectuals are most important since they are the ones who actually elaborate and spread organic ideology.

Gramsci was also plagued by various internal disorders throughout his life. Gramsci completed secondary school in Cagliari, where he lodged with his elder brother Gennaro, a former soldier whose time on the mainland had made him a militant socialist. However, Gramsci's sympathies then did not lie with socialism, but rather with the grievances of impoverished Sardinian peasants and miners, whose mistreatment by the mainlanders would later deeply contribute to his intellectual growth.

### Gramsci, Intellectuals, and Academic Practice Today ...

For Gramsci, neither the organic nor the traditional intellectuals are inherently conservative or radical. Typically, traditional intellectuals – being rooted in their dominant class – are conservative and against systemic change that would rattle the social order.

### What Antonio Gramsci Taught Us About Intellectuals

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Antonio Gramsci (1891 - 1937) was a leading Italian Marxist. He was an intellectual, a journalist and a major theorist who spent his last eleven years in Mussolini's prisons. During this time, he completed 32 notebooks containing almost 3,000 pages.

Gramsci compares Machiavelli's metaphor of a centaur, half beast, half man, to the use of coercion and consent in the exercise of power. Thereby, true hegemony cannot exist by just forcing someone to accept it. Instead, the moral and intellectual leadership of the hegemon must be accepted.

Gramsci's Life and Thought. Gramsci's political and social writings occur in two periods, pre-prison (1910-1926) and prison (1929-35). ### **Antonio Gramsci (1891-1937)**

Gramsci claims that hegemony lies under modern capitalism and that the bourgeoisie can maintain its economic control by allowing certain demands made by trade unions and mass political parties within civil society to be met by the political sphere.
